<u>Licensing:</u> In the City of Norfolk, a license is required for every cat or dog residing in the city as soon as they reach four months of age.
Guidelines for Animal Care:
Vaccination: The emotional support animal must have vaccinations and immunity shots against rabies (and/or other diseases common to the type of animal). In Norfolk, a current rabies certificate is required in order to obtain a license.
Routine care of the animal is expected and includes flea and tick prevention, de-worming, and annual examinations. The University will need verification of this on an annual basis and prior to the animal taking residency.
Emotional support animals must be clean. Daily care may be required to keep animal odor to a minimum.
Animals must be housebroken (e.g. dogs are "housebroken" and cats must be litter box trained. Other small animals such as rabbits, gerbils, are not to be left running loose in a student's room). The student is responsible for properly containing and disposing of all animal waste. Indoor animal waste must be placed in sturdy bag and tied securely before being disposed of in outside trash dumpsters. Outdoor animal waste, such as dog feces, must be immediately picked up by owner, placed in a plastic bag and securely tied before being disposed of in outside trash dumpsters.
Cutting the animal's hair cannot take place within the residence halls or anywhere on University property (off campus locations or professional groomers must be utilized).
The student must effectively control the animal at all times. The animal cannot pose a direct threat to the health and safety of others. If the owner cannot effectively control the animal or if it poses a direct threat to the health or safety of others, the permission to keep that particular animal in University-managed housing will be rescinded until such a time that the problem is resolved.
The emotional support animal will have fresh water and appropriate food on a daily basis.
Cats: Litter boxes must be placed on mats so that waste is not tracked onto carpeted surfaces.
All emotional support animals must be housed in acceptable conditions within the residential area (e.g an appropriately sized crate).
If any animal neglect is suspected, Housing & Residence Life (HRL) will contact the student, Old Dominion University Police Department (ODUPD), and the Humane Society. The handler has the sole responsibility of the animal. The animal should not be left alone for any extended period of time or under the care of roommates or guests.

All animals should have a tag that identifies the owner and contact information in case of an
emergency.
The animal is only permitted in the assigned residence of the student with the accommodation. If the animal spends any length of time in another room or residence, the involved students will be documented and
referred to the conduct process.
Guidelines for interaction with roommates/suitemates and the community:
The emotional support animal may not be taken into classrooms or other buildings on campus or allowed to roam freely on campus grounds.
The student must keep the animal on a leash/lead when the animal is in a public area (e.g., relieving itself outdoors). Emotional support animals are only allowed in indoor common areas as needed to enter and exit University-managed housing. These animals are not permitted in any other area other than the student's residence.
The student is responsible at all times for the actions of the animal. The student is responsible for any odors, noise, damage, or other conduct of the animal that disturbs others or damages the premises.
The student is responsible for assuring that the animal does not interfere or cause difficulties for students who reside in the building. Sensitivity to residents with allergies and to those who fear animals is important to ensure a positive living community.
The student is responsible for instructing others on appropriate interactions with the animal and setting clear expectations.
The emotional support animal may not be left overnight in a university residential facility to be cared for by another student. An owner leaving campus for a prolonged period must remove the emotional support animal from campus.
Roommates/Suitemates will be notified about the animal. The notification will include the type of animal, size, and what services the animal performs. Roommates/Suitemates may request a room change from the Housing & Residence Life if they have a desire to do so.
Any time the student requires service by University Facilities for their room or apartment, they are requested to call in order to arrange a time when they will be present. Additionally, the student's room/apartment number will be placed on a list so that in the event of a need for emergency facilities assistance, University staff is aware of an animal in the location.
Additional Agreements:
The student is financially responsible for the actions of the animal including bodily injury, property damage, replacement of furniture, carpet, blinds, etc. The student is expected to be responsible for all costs
